






2014-2016 Statewide Maternal Mortality Trends

Purpose

 To build a community-level action response to the social and birthing injustice in New Jersey

Goals

- To develop a birth experience survey driven by Black women as the center of the storytelling
- To provide a resource easily accessible to all women, partners, birth workers, community organizations, political leaders, and government institutions interested in Black Infant and Maternal Mortality knowledge and statistics



What is the MES?

- A Community tool developed and designed to improve care and reduce childbirth related disparities for Women of Color.
- Allows women to share their birthing experience in a safe manner embedded with identity acceptance and respect.

Tool Structure and Use

Divided into three sections:

Prenatal, Labor & Delivery, and Postpartum

Inclusive format and health literacy language consideration

User device flexibility

Available in English and Spanish



55% of responses (n=115) came from counties with a Community Advisory Board in place where the MES has launched, with a total of **208 responses** across all counties.






% Responses by Race/Ethnicity

Black birthing people in New Jersey are 7 times more likely to die from pregnancy-related complications compared to their white counterparts.

FACT

Black babies are twice as likely to be born prematurely compared to their white counterparts.






